
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### BUSM PARENT NEWS | FEBRUARY 2019

#### LIFE OF A BUSM STUDENT

This is the day we have worked towards since starting medical school. On this day, the third Friday of March in our fourth year, most of us will find out where we will be going for residency, the next stage of our medical training (a few specialties, such as urology, ophthalmology, and military placements, already matched earlier this year). As you can imagine, the atmosphere at BUSM right now is charged with mixed emotions—excitement, anxiety, nostalgia, frustration, hope—in anticipation of Match Day.

The application to residency, known as "The Match," is unlike any other process we have experienced. For college and medical school, we applied to and interviewed at several schools and received multiple acceptances, from which we chose one to attend after careful consideration. However, the process for residency is different. We can still apply to and interview at many programs (the number depends on our chosen specialty), but at the end we

get just one job offer that we must fulfill under contract. Instituted in 1952, The Match utilizes a sophisticated computer algorithm that (fun fact!) solves the "stable marriage problem" and earned its creators the 2012 Nobel Prize in Economics. It optimizes pairings by taking into account each applicant's personalized numerical "rank list" of every interviewed program and each residency program's rank list of every interviewed applicant.

I learned about this daunting process early on, and when I finally explained it to my parents last year, they were shocked. "What do you mean, you only get accepted to one program? You don't get to pick? But you have to interview at so many places!" Parents and students alike struggle with this.

Being a fourth year medical student is surreal yet satisfying as we look back on our rollercoaster ride through medical school and see how far we have come in our paths to becoming physicians. While the match process is stressful, it is also exciting. We know that 91% of recent BUSM graduates matched to one of their top 4 choices, and 94% reported being satisfied with their match results. Match Day marks the culmination of our struggles and successes, and my classmates and I can't wait to open our envelopes and celebrate this milestone together with faculty, friends, partners, and families.

#### Reaccreditation Process Update Deborah Vaughan, Ph.D. LCME Faculty Accreditation Lead


On December 3, 2018, BUSM uploaded our package of accreditation materials to the LCME. These materials consisted of a 430-page Data Collection document, an appendix of over 200 items, a 35-page Self-Study produced by our Self-Study Task Force, and the students' independent survey and analysis.

Well over 200 faculty, administrators, staff, and students have taken part in this endeavor over the past 18 months. We had a mock, or practice, 2-day site visit with 3 consultants December 16-18, which we found to be extremely valuable. What remains is our preparations for the highly-structured February 24-27 visit by the LCME survey team of 5 peers who will meet in 21 different sessions during their visit. We will receive a report from the survey team just before they leave on Wednesday, February 27.
