
Christine Gunn, PhD

His current study will explore notions of survival, recovery, and perceived healthcare needs of patients in long-term, sustained opioid use disorder recovery.

Dr. Tsoy-Podosenin is a first-year Addiction Psychiatry Fellow at Mount Sinai Hospital, New York. Originally from Russia, she graduated from St Petersburg Pavlov State Medical University, and was involved in a series of clinical trials studying naltrexone in combination with fluoxetine, guanfacine, and a comparison of long-acting injectable and implantable formulations of naltrexone vs. oral naltrexone for treatment of opioid use disorder. Her research interests focus on exploring the ability of opioid antagonists to normalize the activity of the brain reward system and investigating the efficacy of ketamine for treatment of substance use disorders.

Sam Young, MD



Dr. Young is an Addiction Medicine Fellow with the British Columbia Centre on Substance Use and a General Internal Medicine Fellow at the University of British Columbia. Her research focuses on the use of harm reduction strategies, including supervised consumption services, in order to improve care and health outcomes for people who use drugs. Her current research project will examine the impact of an inhospital supervised consumption facility on hospitalized patients with a diagnosed substance use disorder.

Geetanjali Chander, MD, MPH

Dr. Chander is an Associate Professor of Medicine and Epidemiology at Johns Hopkins University. A general internist, her clinical work and research sit at the nexus of HIV and substance use, including alcohol, tobacco and other drug use. She examines epidemiological aspects of HIV and alcohol use/other drug use among persons with HIV (PWH), and works on the adaptation and testing of person and computer-delivered interventions for unhealthy alcohol use for delivery in clinical and community settings.

Yasmin Hurd, PhD

Dr. Hurd is Professor of Psychiatry, Neuroscience and Pharmacological Sciences as well as the Ward Coleman Chair of Translational Neuroscience at the Icahn School of Medicine. Her translational research examines the neurobiology of drug abuse and related psychiatric disorders, and a major focus of the research is directed to risk factors of addiction disorders including genetics as well as developmental exposure to drugs of abuse. In addition to her research endeavors, Dr. Hurd is Director of the Addiction Institute at Mount Sinai within the Behavioral Health System.
