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

PREPARING FOR SURGERY

The safety and comfort of our patients is our priority. You play an important role in partnering with us to ensure a safe, efficient, and exceptional experience.

If you have any remaining questions after reading through this brochure, please call your surgeon's office. If it is the day of your surgery, call the operating room where your surgery is scheduled.

Key Points to Remember:

- → Aside from the pills you were told to take with a small sip of water, do not eat or drink ANYTHING after midnight or the morning of your surgery. This includes mints, candy or gum.
- Remember to shower using the special soap (Chlorhexadine) the night before and the morning of your surgery.
- A nurse will call you the day before your surgery. If you do not receive a phone call, please call your surgeon's office to confirm your appointment time.
- → Make sure your insurance is active, and will still be active on the day you are scheduled to have surgery.

CHANGES TO YOUR MEDICATION SCHEDULE:

It is extremely important that you are aware of the changes that will need to be made to your normal medication schedule 7 days before your surgery.

1 WEEK BEFORE SURGERY:



Stop taking Ibuprofen, Motrin, Advil, Aleve, Naprosyn, Relafen. Daypro, Nuprin and Celebrex.

Stop taking herbal medications/dietary supplements, such as garlic pills, vitamin E, St. John's Wort, and multivitamins.

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
Check with Your Doctor: Follow instructions given to you by your Nurse Practitioner or Doctor at the Pre-Procedure

Clinic concerning Coumadin.



Tylenol (Acetaminophen) is acceptable.

Aspirin: Please continue to take Aspirin up until the night before your surgery if you have had a heart attack, heart disease, heart failure, previous heart surgery or a stroke.



BEFORE SURGERY

SHOWER THE NIGHT BEFORE AND MORNING OF YOUR SURGERY

Chorhexadine Shower Instructions:

- You may shampoo your hair using your normal shampoo and products.
- Apply Chlorhexadine (AKA "Hibiclens") to your whole body (Use ½ bottle of for each shower).
- Gently scrub your entire body from the neck down for 5 minutes, focusing on the surgical site.
- Avoid eyes, nose, mouth and genital area.
- Do not wash your body with soap after using Hibiclens.
- Rinse and dry yourself thoroughly.
- Do not apply any powders or deodorants after showering.

PREPARATION OF THE SURGICAL SITE

- DO NOT shave the area where the incision will be made.
- You may shave your face, underarms, or legs, but you must do this before showering the evening before your surgery.
- The nurse may use clippers to remove body hair at or near the surgical site.
- Remember not to apply any lotions, creams, petroleum jelly or powder on your skin following your morning shower.

AFTER SHOWERING Do not use hair products.

- Do not wear make-up.
- Do not wear nail polish.
- Remove jewelry (including rings and all body piercings). Jewelry, including body piercings, presents a potential safety risk.
- Do not wear your contact lenses. Please wear your glasses, or remember to bring your contact lens case with you.

BEFORE LEAVING FOR THE HOSPITAL CHECKLIST

- Stop eating after midnight the night before and the day of surgery (this includes no breakfast).
- at home.

- Remove contact lenses, and wear only your glasses or bring your contact lens case with you.
- Bring your identification and insurance card.
- Plan to arrive 2 hours prior to surgery.

SURGICAL PROCESS

- If you are running late on the day of your surgery or have guestions or concerns about anything regarding your surgery, please call the operating room.


Meet your Surgeon, Anesthesiologist, and Nurse Care Team.




